Mallorca, Spain, March 2006 Don Leet, leader

What a wonderful 2 weeks in Mallorca, biking on this fabulous Mediterranean island off the coast of Spain. We were based at the same hotel for the entire stay, and since breakfast and dinner were included our group was able to really bond and reinforce old HeartCycle acquaintances as well as develop new lasting friendships. Thank you to Don, our leader from Portland, and Andy, our assistant leader from Scotland for helping us to have a terrific time in this cycling Paradise!! And Andy, it was great having you along so that you brought down the average age of our riders by a few years!

Since we were centrally located in the town of Porto Pollenta on the NE side of the island we were able to experience all terrain options. This included riding along the seacoast, going over rolling hills from village to village, passing through the Natural Wetland Marshes which allowed Barbara to do some very interesting bird watching, and of course getting into the foothills and nearby mountain passes. The friendly and laid back atmosphere of the island allowed us to choose the type of riding we wanted to do. Don would meet with our group most mornings, explaining the recommended ride for the day, offering numerous options (including for some the option of simply hanging around the hotel and going for a short walk and out to a wonderful café for lunch). Then we'd split into groups and go! For Don, Andy, Steve and Bob.....that meant go go go! For many of us that meant building up our training day by day and for others it meant doing whatever they felt like, whenever they were in the mood.

The first day's ride was to "Cap de Formentor". Although it was only 26 miles it was challenging. Half the group that rented bikes were busy adjusting the fit, and for Ginny's rented bike, repairing the 1st of 3 flat tires but the ride had spectacular views of the coast and coves, with good first day hill training. Don had warned us about a tunnel we'd have to

ride or walk our bikes through, and unfortunately it was on this first day's ride that one of our riders had a biking injury.

Sometimes in these tunnels riders get vertigo in the darkness (although the light at the end of the tunnel was always visible) and Marcy suddenly found herself riding in the oncoming traffic lane. When another biker going the opposite direction hit her, Marcy was injured and unable to ride the rest of the trip. Dealing



with a lot of pain, having to use crutches for the rest of the stay, and then going back to Portland and having surgery for a tibia patella fracture was not what she had planned when signing up for this trip. Marcy was a trooper though and tried to make the best of this misfortune. We are all hoping for Marcy to have a rapid and full recovery. And For Don S., who had to return home early, we all missed you and are wishing you the best.

Mallorca tour report continued from page 1

Our second day's ride was supposed to be approximately 40 miles, to Selva, but when we got stuck in what seemed like a Mediterranean Hurricane, we were lucky to get in 25 and be happy to return before getting hypothermic! Weatherwise, that was our only day of rain, and except for a few chilly days, riding was terrific. In fact numerous European biking teams train in Mallorca in March and we were continuously passed up by serious German and British teams who took advantage of the biker friendliness of this Island and although not carless, roads were generally quiet or with big shoulders.

Highlight rides included the towns of Campenet, Petra, Luc, Bunyola, Alcudia, Selva, all beautiful, often with parts of medieval walls and always a square around a cathedral filled with "bars" (cafes) and bikers having a relaxing lunch before heading back on the bicycle. But the real highlight ride of the trip was the Sa Calobra ride. For me, (& for Bruce, in between his frequent habitual moans and groans) this was by far the island's signature ride. First riders need to get up the pass leading to Lluc. Then there's a spectacular, narrow, winding snake like road which drops 2700 feet of elevation in 6 miles down to the sea. Tourist buses go by frequently, but they are slow and careful whenever they pass bikers, and for me they just kept giving me an adrenalin rise making the climb up the hill less painful. And my trying to keep up with MaryAnne and Bill only added to the challenge and the satisfaction of such terrific riding.



Other highlights included an elegant lunch in a winery, having fun shopping in the open market, taking home the famous ("fake") Mallorcan pearls, taking a bus to the city of Palma and walking along the waterfront and climbing to the castle, looking forward to our dinner table for 20 with friends each night (although many of us tried out the lovely restaurants nearby as well), celebrating Devon's birthday with the 6 free bottles of wine we were given since our bus had been so late, and most of all, just waking up everyday, looking out to the Mediterranean, and knowing all I need to do is eat, drink, sleep, ride, and be with good HeartCycle buddies day after day, for 2 enchanting weeks! What a great way to start off the season!!

GO FOR THE GOLD Sept. 23-25, 2006

Overall moderate to advanced tour.

Bicycle the magnificent aspen country Saturday, Sunday and Monday, September 23, 24, 25 2006. We will meet Friday night and stay in Carbondale for the whole tour.

Saturday the ride will be moderate (one Big hill at Woody Creek, so be prepared) from Carbondale to Aspen, almost all of this day is on bike paths now, which is great. Lunch is on your own in the quaint Aspen eateries. Head on back or extend the day with an advanced climb up into the Maroon Bells. Sunday we will rise and shine with breakfast reservations set up at the Village Smithy for those who would like to participate— not to be missed. This is not part of the tour cost.

Sunday's ride will be to Glenwood with an easy option to take the bike path along Glenwood Canyon, and/or an advanced climb up to the Sunlight ski area for more incredible views of the Roaring Fork Valley.

A highlight of the tour will be the Monday ride through Redstone (moderate, steady climb) and then the advanced climb (well it is only about 10% for a short distance!) to the top of McClure's pass. This is a breathtaking ride. The road up the Redstone valley to McClure's can be busy on the weekends, thus the Monday ride day. There is no sag support for this tour

and no bag-packing, so come and enjoy. Saturday is the traditional social gathering as part of the tour cost. We will supply beverages and snacks from about 4:30 to 5:30 pm. All meals are on your own. Reservations will be made for some of the group to eat dinner together, per the interest of the group.

If riders are not prepared to participate in the planned rides, there are easy to moderate rides that can be done if the riders are willing to go on their own. The club will not be responsible for these riders. Riders who participate in the planned rides will have first preference of rooms, however, should the accommodations at the Lodge fill. The Days Inn is available for overflow, but there is a \$20/night increase in the tour cost for this option. This is a joint Colorado Heart Cycle/ Denver Bicycle Touring Club ride, so look forward to meeting new riding friends.

5 YEAR FINANCAL REVIEW: A REPORT TO THE MEMBERSHIP

It was 2004 and HeartCycle was in financial trouble. Three out of previous four years HeartCycle had lost money and had now been forced to dip significantly into reserves. By the end of 2004, we had only a total of \$15,922 in the bank (cash + reserves), which was not a viable fiscal position. A cash/flow crisis was looming. Another year of losses may have meant.... No, it's too horrible to even mention!

It was under this dire cloud that the Board had to take a long, hard look at what happened. Actual tour costs were up, participation was down and even some of the tours that went out full lost money for the club. The pricing assumptions that had gone into each tour's cost were analyzed and some were found to be wanting. For instance, the costs of lodging were frequently underestimated with the actual cost at times exceeding the estimate by several thousand dollars. Each tour had been priced to generate revenue over actual cost to pay HeartCycle's overhead and this was not happening. While there is always some WAG-ing ("Wild Ass Guessing") that goes into pricing tours, and unexpected and unpredicted expenses do occur, the losses could not continue. Change had to be implemented.

Therefore, in the fall of 2004, it was deemed necessary to upgrade and improve the tour pricing model and to build in enough over-tour-cost revenue to not only meet estimated operating expense, but also to begin

to rebuild financial reserves. Concurrently, efforts were made to attempt to decrease operating costs where possible. (For example, receiving the HC newsletter by email.) Given that most of the operational costs HC has little to no control over – postage, insurance, printing, etc. – it was clear that not much could be saved. But, the effort was needed.

And the result – SUCCESS! Indeed, better than had been hoped for. The tours in 2005 had better participation and the improved pricing model assumptions worked well. Even with having to cancel three tours, a not wholly unexpected event, the revenue generated exceeded costs. Plus, the operational costs were able to be pared down nearly \$3500 from the prior year. HeartCycle is now once again financially stable and the world as we know it WILL continue!

The Statement of Income and Expense and also the Statement of Financial Position are included in this newsletter for your review. These can demonstrate in more (mind-numbing!) detail how far HeartCycle has progressed. Please remember: even a non-profit club such as HeartCycle is must have money to cover its expenses. Having reserve funds is both prudent and appropriate.
